Plymouth Library Needs Our Help



“Greetings from Plymouth District Library. Specifically, I am reaching out to any groups that enjoy refreshments. The library is having an increasing problem with groups leaving the meeting rooms quite a mess with crumbs and stickiness on the floor and tables. As you are aware, **one of the requirements of using our spaces is that you leave the room clean and ready for the next group.** The library has a very limited custodial staff that must maintain our entire building including ten restrooms; we must therefore rely on meeting room users to clean up after themselves. When we can rely on our groups this way, it allows us to make space available without charge and allows groups to have food in the rooms.

Please help us to be able to keep offering this valuable resource to the community by cleaning up after your group. This may mean building in extra time to the end of your reservation or planning to complete your activities a few minutes earlier to ensure that you have time to bring the room back to ready condition. A vacuum cleaner and table cleaning spray can be found in the kitchenette attached to the Walldorf Room (which is accessible from the foyer for those in the Dunning Room.) If you ever need help finding these tools, please ask at the circulation desk. Thank you for your support on this matter and for helping us to be able to keep offering this community resource.”
